

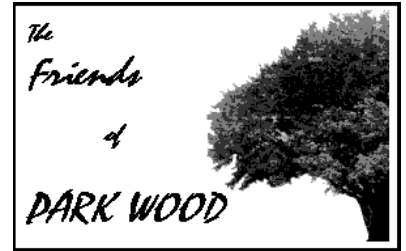

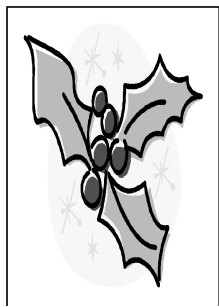

Presently very small but they will grow! Varieties are all native species and found in the wood - wild cherry, hazel, Dog rose, hawthorn, crab apple, rowan.

Physical Activity officer



Sophie Jevons is the Physical Activity Officer at Havant Borough Council working to get more adults doing 5 x 30 minutes a week of Physical Activity! Sophie introduced the Get Active Havant campaign in June 2009 and since then the amount of adults doing 5 x 30 minutes a week in Havant has risen from 16% to 29%. Sophie attends events, puts on Return to Sport courses and helps fund new exercise classes in the borough of Havant. However, the campaign is not all about sport but promoting free ways you can spend your 30 minutes such as walking, gardening and doing the housework! Sales of Forestry Commission Land

You may have seen the article in the News or on Radio Solent or signs around Queens Enclosure about the sale of forests. Concerns have been growing and MP's are receiving increasing numbers of letters prompted by the Save Our Forests campaign on the internet. Our local MP, George Hollingbery, has written to the Minister asking for clarification of the position regarding Queens Inclosure and Creech Wood in Denmead and whether this ancient woodland could be put up for disposal. SPARROWS

The results of the Sparrow Survey are now available on <http://www3.hants.gov.uk/hampshire-countryside/housesparrow>

There is a lot of information on the website, but here is a taster.

Counting sparrows

Sparrows are extremely sociable birds and during the breeding season tend to form loose groups of 10 - 20 pairs. Where recorders were able to count the number of sparrows, many saw fewer than six birds, suggesting low breeding densities. Despite this, a small number of recorders were lucky enough to find larger colonies of 20 or 30 sparrows, and some as many as 60 or more birds. This mixed picture reveals that in some areas of Hampshire, sparrows are thriving, but we still have gaps in our knowledge from areas where no records were received.

Sparrows at home

88% of all records received were observed from people's homes - from **gardens, balconies** and **communal areas**. Along with farmland, gardens are known to be the preferred habitat of House Sparrows, historically offering suitable places to find food, nest, and bring up young.

Places to nest

Close to half the number of nests recorded were found in **roofs**, followed by **hedges** and **nest boxes**.

Sparrows are opportunists when it comes to finding a good nest site and have managed to make the most of some unusual locations. During the survey we received multiple records of sparrow nests up **telegraph poles**, in **air vents**, within **conifers** and abandoned **House Martin nests**.

The House Sparrow is in significant decline nationally, but there are wide differences between the status of populations in different regions of the country. We hope to contribute to this knowledge through the results of this survey.

Fun, fresh air and fables at Park Wood!

Hampshire County Council's Countryside Service has received funding from the Aiming High for Disabled Children programme to develop 6 'story trails' in Hampshire's countryside. We have asked Orange Apples, a professional story telling company, to write us a story based sites across the County. There are three strands to the project: events where Orange Apples tell the stories, a training day for site staff and volunteers* so that they can learn storytelling skills and a leaflet pack which families can use to tell the stories themselves as self guided trails. There is a small amount of money also available for some physical improvement to the paths as well as props and craft materials for the events themselves.

We are really excited about the project and are delighted that you have given us permission to use Park Wood as one of the venues. Hopefully through the project we will be able to encourage families who don't usually venture into the countryside to come out and enjoy the fresh air and freedom of the outdoors. We can also use the opportunity ourselves to learn a bit more about the small improvements we can make to our sites and the way we communicate, to ensure that we are as welcoming as we possibly can be to everyone.

The Park Wood event is scheduled for **6th March at 10am**. It would be great if you could get the word out to as many people as possible. Though the event is mainly targeted at children with disabilities and their families, everyone is welcome. The only thing I would say is that booking is essential!
