Sparrowhawk

Autumn is a really good time to watch out for a very special bird in your garden.

Young <u>sparrowhawks</u> are striking out on their own into the big, wide world.

If you're not sure if you've seen a sparrowhawk, check www.rspb.org.uk/wildlife/birdguide/name/s/sparrowhawk/identific ation.aspx

Some people aren't fond of seeing these predators in their garden. As the cliche goes, nature is red in tooth (or beak) and claw and sometimes that can be a bit too close to home.

If you are lucky enough to see a sparrowhawk, wish it good luck. Only 10 per cent of its hunting attempts will be successful!

Being an effective hunter is never easy. And it's even more difficult if you're a young bird which doesn't have the benefit of experience. Only 34 per cent of sparrowhawks hatched this year will see their first birthday next spring, and lack of hunting knowhow plays a large part in that.
